# Dr. Elsie Field's 1925 letters from China

Margot Jerrard, writer, editor, and long time friend of the late Dr. Elsie Field, will share letters written by Dr. Elsie Field and stories about her.

Dr. Field was the medical director at Planned Parenthood in Champaign from 1974, through the 1980s. She did her undergraduate work at Radcliff and received her M.D. from Columbia College in 1930. While at Planned Parenthood she insisted the clinic develop a more medically oriented system, trained third year medical students in OB-GYN rotations, and stressed that it was important for students to develop sensitivity to their patients.

# **Expanded Role for the Legal Advocacy Fund**

The Legal Advocacy Fund has experienced several changes as AAUW has been engaging in a strategic process during the last three years. Beginning this year, LAF is throwing its support to cases that protect women in all workplaces, not just to those cases arising in the academic context as it has before.

Further, in the past LAF has been focused more on deserving individuals; the new emphasis will be to select landmark cases for support. These will be cases that have the potential to set precedent and address significant issues that clearly impact AAUW's fight for pay equity and workplaces free of sex discrimination. The goal is to protect other individuals in the future.

LAF will continue to provide travel grants and stipends to LAF speakers as requested by branches In fact, one criterion to be selected for support will be that the individual is willing to travel to make presentations to branches that request a speaker.

The Fund is looking for support from the membership. That will be vital if LAF is to be successful as it broadens its scope beyond academia and strives to be effective in achieving significant gains through strategic litigation.

# February Book (Black History Month):

#### Slavery by Another Name by Douglas A. Blackmon (2008)

The shocking story of post-Civil War intimidation of African-Americans through a system of involuntary servitude that involved the courts, US corporations, mine owners, local farmers, and others to whom prisoners were leased for hard physical labor. Fraudulent arrests, trials and sentences sent over 100,000 men into dangerous working conditions, with no hope of legal redress. The practice continued until the start of WWII.

# March Book (Women's History Month):

## Mother Jones: the most dangerous woman in America by Elliott J. Gorn (2001)

The life and exploits of this legendary icon of labor organizing and advocating for the underdogs of our society—miners laboring in unsafe conditions, children working in factories and sweatshops, and others oppressed by poverty and ignorance. Her motto was "Pray for the dead and fight like hell for the living." If you cannot get a copy of this book, two others are available and can be substituted.

# What's Happening by Co-President Helen Miron

During the past year AAUW has played an integral role in the passage of public policy legislation in Washington. President Obama just signed into law the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. The Fair Pay Act has updated and strengthened the older Equal Pay Act, and public support has encouraged Congress to pass the GI Bill for the 21st Century, which includes provisions for expanding grants to part-time students, most of who are women and girls. These issues and more have a direct impact on our daughters and us. When we make legislators aware of our concerns and our wishes we can make things happen. There was a great push during the national elections to talk with the candidates about issues that concerned us and the changes we would like to see, and they are responding to those concerns. The elections are over and a new administration is in Washington, but we need to keep our momentum going; our work isn't finished until there is real equity educationally and economically for women and girls everywhere. Keep pushing. Inform your legislators; state and federal, how you feel about the issues and what you feel should be changed. They do listen to us.

Our next Saturday Luncheon Forum will feature Margot Jerrard, speaking on Dr. Elsie Field and her work as medical director of Planned Parenthood.
