FEBRUARY BOOK—Black History Month

Family Properties: Race, Real Estate, and the Exploitation of Black Urban America Author: Beryl Satter (2009)

This book is about the history of the wide-spread and systematic economic exploitation of African-Americans in the real estate market in Chicago during the 1950s and 1960s. Redlining of black neighborhoods and lack of equal access to credit forced the majority of black homeowners into contract ownership under unscrupulous terms, leading to impoverishment for many homeowners and the decline of black neighborhoods into slums while speculative investors reaped big profits.

MARCH BOOK-Women's History Month

When Everything Changed: The Amazing Journey of American Women from 1960 to the Present Author: Gail Collins (2009)

New York Times columnist Collins goes behind the scenes of the women's rights movement, describing the closed opportunities and limited horizons that women faced in 1960. Facts, court cases, legislation, and personal anecdotes are used to show how far American women have come in every aspect of their lives. Collins reminds us of what we remember and shows us what we've forgotten about this critical period in women's history.

We established a second scholarship at Parkland two years ago to address the increased need women have for financial assistance in returning to school and completing their education. Thanks to the generosity of our members who donate to Local Scholarships, we now feel confident that we can continue offering the second scholarship at Parkland, so it is time to give it a name.

The Board has chosen Amy Kummerow as the branch member for whom the scholarship will be named. Amy has served the branch in many ways over the years, including being a Co-President and International Chairperson. For several years she has hosted the Adelante book discussion group in her home. Amy told us that years ago she taught Sociology at Parkland, and she has always been a generous supporter

of our local scholarships. Amy's years of service to the community, including serving on the County Board, are recognized by all who have had the privilege of knowing her.



We invite our members to honor Amy's dedication to AAUW and the cause of promoting equity for women by making donations to our local scholarships in Amy's name. Each Parkland scholarship is \$800 for the school year, and the UI scholarship is \$1000, so we need to raise a minimum of \$2,600 each year. Jean Thompson Passed Away

Jean Thompson, a branch member, died on January 20 at age 84. She was a member of the Writers' Group and read her works at the December holiday brunches. The following is taken from her obituary -

Although a long and avid student of the Women's Suffrage Movement and writer of poems, her writing and reading of poems and short stories was focal in recent years with friends in the AAUW. Their responses to her work buoyed spirits delightfully. She was a radiant gem in the family. AAUW to Receive Cy Pres Award for Work to Fight Gender Discrimination Award Follows Groundbreaking Gender Discrimination Case Settlement

The American Association of University Women (AAUW) has been awarded \$23,500 as part of a cy pres award from the judgment in the largest gender discrimination case to ever go to trial.

The class action lawsuit against Novartis Pharmaceuticals Corporation included approximately 5,600 women sales force employees who claimed gender discrimination based on pay, promotion, and pregnancy. A jury found Novartis liable for gender discrimination in May 2010, and the subsequent settlement was filed in federal court in New York in July 2010. Judge Colleen McMahon of the U.S. District Court for Eastern New York approved the final settlement agreement in November, and AAUW learned of its selection to receive a cy pres award in December.

Cy pres awards are the result of class action lawsuit funds and are typically distributed to charitable organizations. AAUW will receive this award to support its mission to advance equity for women and girls.
