
Slaves in the Family

Ball traces his family back to their first arrival on American shores and also traces the lineage of the slaves his ancestors once owned. He follows their stories through the decades, using plantation records, interviews with descendents of both the Balls and their slaves, and travels to Africa and the American South, He has constructed a story of the riches and squalor, violence and insurrection, pride and shame, that make up the history and legacy of slavery in America.
