"Moms and Babies Program at Decatur Correctional Center"

Come learn about this special program for female inmates who are pregnant when they become incarcerated. They can apply to live on a special unit, give birth, and instead of having to relinquish their baby immediately, they can return to the Decatur prison with their baby and raise it there until they are scheduled for release (as long as it is within two years of the baby's birth). The state does not provide support for the babies so the women depend on donations of baby items and gift cards that the staff uses to shop for on-going needs.

We want to "shower" Susan Creek with donations for the babies. During August and September six babies were born and more are due. The items most needed now are 0-3 month clothing, especially for girls, and the bag sleepers with elastic at the bottom. Scrapbook kits are also helpful because each mother is required to keep one for her baby's pictures. Many pictures are taken of the babies so that they will have the same kind of picture albums of themselves, as do children raised in their own homes. Batteries in sizes AA, C, D for the toys on the unit are needed, and rechargeable batteries are especially useful. Gift cards from Walmart or Target in any amount are very helpful to the staff. Clothing in larger sizes and baby care items are always needed, so if you've bought those please bring them. The newborns need the smaller sizes but they do grow quickly.

Another kind of donation is used women's clothing, generally in larger sizes, which the released inmates can use for job interviews. At this time of year many of us receive multiple one-year calendars (one month per page) and these are distributed throughout the prison. Women on the Moms & Babies unit especially need them because they have a lot of meetings, classes, and other events. As long as the calendar does not have a spiral binder it can be donated. The prison does not allow metal objects such as spiral binders, nor does it allow glass items.
