OCTOBER BOOK (Disability Awareness Month):

The Water Giver: The Story of a Mother, a Son, and Their Second Chance Author: Joan Ryan (2009)

At age 16 the author's adopted son Ryan, who had developmental disabilities, suffered a severe traumatic closed head injury. She had felt frustrated by her inability to "fix" him as he grew up, and she became more his relentless reformer than his loving mother. Now she had a second chance at motherhood as he again learned the simple tasks of living. She became more accepting of him as he was, not as she wanted him to be, and in the process came to terms with her limitations and recognized what an amazing, heroic person Ryan was.

NOVEMBER BOOK

Half the Sky: Turning Oppression into Opportunity for Women Worldwide Authors: Nicholas Kristof and Sheryl WuDunn (2009)

The authors (husband and wife) give a detailed analysis of the plight of women in developing countries, focusing particularly on sex trafficking, maternal mortality, and gender-based violence. They argue that the oppression of women in developing countries is a devastating injustice that demands a moral and political movement to eradicate it, highlighting stories of women who overcame tremendous odds/abuse.

Greg Mortenson, author of the book, *Three Cups of Tea*, has spearheaded the establishment of 164 schools in Pakistan and Afghanistan since 1993. Thirty-seven of these were built in 2010 alone. The schools are serving 68,000 students, including 56,000 girls.

Our board of directors has approved branch support of the work of Mortenson's organization, the Central Asia Institute (CAI), by donating financially. That's why we will be "passing the hat" at some of our meetings and we hope the membership will support this endeavor by contributing to it.

The aims of CAI are consistent with the AAUW mission, **Breaking through Barriers for Women and Girls**, and the education of women in those countries may very well be one of the solutions to the vexing question of political stability there. A great deal of CAI's accomplishments is due to working closely with local leaders rather than through the governments of the two countries. As International Relations chair, I hope the membership will join in with this endeavor.

Mortenson was one of the main speakers at a recent AAUW convention, and his second book, Stones Into Schools is the January selection for Adelante.

Sabrina Gosnell




