We also put our money where our mouth is by providing opportunities for members to give to our local scholarships and AAUW-National's Fellowships and Grants Program and Legal Advocacy Fund.

At the state level, opportunities for leadership and learning are available to members through informative events like the district meetings to be held this fall, as well as the state convention being held jointly with Missouri in May, 2013 in St Louis. Two of our own C-U branch members are serving AAUW at the state level: Margaret Stewart is serving on the AAUW-IL Board as Co-Membership Vice President, and Sallie Miller is serving as the District 2 Director. Nationally, AAUW commissions research on topics like pay equity, sexual harassment, and economic security for older women, and develops action items to address these important issues. They have several leadership opportunities for the next generation of women leaders through various college leadership projects. They advance educational opportunities for women through their Fellowships and Grants program, and work to combat sex discrimination through various programs within the Legal Advocacy Fund. You can also sign up for their 2-Minute Activist to receive Action Alerts via email on current issues and legislation, including how you can respond.

In short, AAUW is more relevant now more than ever, and there is strength in numbers. 
Join us to hear about Dr. Li's research of the honey bee and fruit fly.

Each year, the Champaign-Urbana Branch gives three scholarships to women who are returning to college after experiencing an interruption in their education. Two scholarships are awarded to Parkland College students and one to a student at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Richelle Brown is this year's recipient of our Ida King Stevens Award at the University of Illinois. She attended Parkland College and transferred to UIUC in 2011. She is pursuing a double major in Integrative Biology and Anthropology. After completion of her undergraduate education, she plans to continue in medical school with the intent of becoming a practicing physician.
