Shop at Schnucks? You can support AAUW

Schnucks has established a program through which community organizations can register and receive financial support from Schnucks when shoppers designate their interest in supporting the organization. To participate, individuals can obtain a Schnucks Customer Card and register it in the Schnucks eScrip program to designate the AAUW branch as the recipient of a rebate on their Schnucks purchases.

In order for the branch to receive the funds, shoppers must show their Schnucks Customer Card to the cashier at each visit. We appreciate the support of our members and encourage others who shop at Schnucks to use the eScrip program to help the branch receive this rebate money.

The easiest way to participate in the eScrip program is to ask for a card at the Customer Service desk, then call 1-800-931-6258 and register your card. Each card has its own 12 digit number. In addition to giving your card's number and your name, address, etc., you need to give the Champaign-Urbana Branch Group ID number, which is 500043846. Please note that our branch is currently registered in the eScrip programs as American Association of University Women, not AAUW.
