Along with her studies in the United States, she is also participating in variety of extracurricular and volunteering activities. In spring 2013, she joined the Global Consulting Program at UIUC, where she worked on a semester-long project that was delivered in Sao Paulo, Brazil. Currently, she is a senior leadership and internal development team member of the Innovation Immersion Program at UIUC, where she works on marketing plans, recruiting, and special event organization.

Deeply committed to volunteer work, she is the Operations Manager of the DoCha (Downtown Champaign) Free Music Festival, where she works on festival's logistics, marketing and advertising strategies, as well as organization of children's educational programs. 
Name: Itzel Vazquez-Vidal Citizenship: Mexico Degree and Field: Ph.D., Nutrition.

" I got my BS in biology at University Autonomous of San Luis Potosi (UASLP) and then I got my MS in Neurobiology from National University of Mexico (UNAM) in Mexico.

My doctoral research is part of a collaborative research program between the University of San Luis Potosi in Mexico, and the University of Illinois. This multidisciplinary investigation focuses on genetics, obesity and social-environment factors (UP-AMIGOS). At this moment, my research indicates that women are a vulnerable group with more cardiovascular risk factors than men. My research study will provide useful information about genetic variants and environmental factors associated with dyslipidemia in young college students. This study could be used to design universal screening tool and it will help to promote educational programs on healthy lifestyles among young Mexican college students, especially among women.

During my first year at UIUC, I served as a nutrition instructor for Latino families in the Abriendo Caminos project developed by Dr. Angela Wiley. This experience facilitated the development of my teaching skills as well as my understanding of the needs of the Latino community related to nutrition education. During the development of this program I worked very close with Latino women who were concerned about the nutrition of their children. I am proud of this experience because I was able to apply classroom knowledge in order to encourage mothers to make better choices for their families. I have mentored high school students during summer program who were award winners, and several undergraduate students.

Currently, I am a fourth year graduate student at the department of Food Science and Human Nutrition (FSHN), I will graduate next May. I certainly consider that the AAUW International Fellowship helped me to continue my research to provide essential information about the impact of obesity in the health status of young Mexicans."
