On Tyranny: Twenty Lessons from the Twentieth Century by Timothy Snyder

Snyder, an historian of fascism, serves up lessons in how to recognize and resist a turn towards authoritarianism. His book makes connections between the past and the times we live in and has been a best-selling book.

The Great Influenza: The Story of the Deadliest Pandemic in History by John M. Barry

This is the definitive history of the 1918 Flu Pandemic. It's a long book so you might want to give yourself extra time to read it. It's another best-seller and certainly, and tragically, timely. C-5, U-1

The Color of Law: A Forgotten History of How Our Government Segregated America by Richard Rothstein

Winning multiple awards and accolades when it was published in 2018, Rothstein's book documents how government policies purposely worked to deny Blacks opportunities to live in neighborhoods with jobs, good schools, and upward mobility.

To Protect and Serve: How to Fix America's Police by Norm Stamper

Stamper is a former Seattle police chief. He offers a blueprint for restructuring the law enforcement system by creating a community -based police department. He also advocates fundamental changes in the role of the federal government and citizen involvement. C-1, U-1

Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents by Isabel Wilkerson

Wilkerson is the author of The Warmth of Other Suns which was a former Adelante selection. Here she explores the hidden hierarchical caste systems across the world and here in the U.S. which influence our lives, behaviors, and our nations' histories. It's an Oprah's Book Club pick. C-2, U-1

May 19

Tightrope: Americans Reaching for Hope by Nicolas Kristof and Sheryl Wu Dunn Kristof explores the left-behind America by revisiting his former schoolmates in rural Oregon. He "brings a human face to issues such as drug addiction, incarceration, family dysfunction, and declining prospects for employment" and offers solutions.

Rage Against the Minivan by Kristin Howerton

Howerton, a marriage and family therapist, writes with humor and insight into what it means to be a parent in today's culture and how to free oneself from the cult of perfect motherhood. C-2, U-1

The Bridge Ladies: A Memoir by Betsy Lerner

Lerner learns to understand her mother and their fraught relationship through friendship with her mother's bridge club members. This was a former CPL book club pick. C-14 plus several audio versions

August 18

Hissing Cousins: The Lifelong Rivalry of Eleanor Roosevelt and Alice Roosevelt Longworth by March Peyser

Another CPL book club pick, this is a double biography of the famous first cousins and their places in history.
